

#### **Convention Rules of Order**

## THE EPISCOPAL DIOCESE OF EAST TENNESSEE 40th ANNUAL CONVENTION – FEBRUARY 9-10, 2024 RULES OF ORDER

Adopted by Bishop and Council on December 5, 2023 & for adoption by Convention at the opening of business Saturday, February 10, 2024

The 40th Annual Meeting of the Convention of the Episcopal Diocese of East Tennessee will be held in person at St. John's Cathedral and the Episcopal School of Knoxville, Tennessee, on February 9 & 10, 2024, with certain Pre-Convention Committee proceedings conducted in advance electronically by remote attendance. Certain modifications of the provisions for Pre-Convention Committee proceedings and meetings of the Convention in the Canons and Rules of Order are set forth in these Rules of Order to accommodate the limited scope of Committee business pursuant to an electronic meeting.

#### I. ORDER OF BUSINESS

- Rule 1.01: The Order of Business shall be specified and approved by the Convention.
- Rule 1.02: During balloting, the Convention may take up business, which may be interrupted for the reports of tellers and additional ballots.

#### II. CONVENTION COMMITTEES

- Rule 2.01: The Bishop shall appoint the following Convention Committees: On Credentials, On Elections, On General Resolutions.
- Rule 2.02: The Bishop shall appoint the following committees as prescribed by the Canons or as otherwise required: On Constitution and Canons.
- Rule 2.03: Such Committees as are instructed by the Bishop shall convene in advance of the opening of Convention to consider matters referred to them. Open hearings of said committees held prior to Convention shall be subject to prior notice for access and participation by means of remote attendance and may be held in accordance with these rules.
- Rule 2.04: Certain pre-Convention Committee proceedings and pre-Convention business may be conducted, pursuant to notice of specific business to be taken up, through use of an Internet meeting service designated by the Bishop that supports anonymous voting and visible displays (a) identifying those participating, (b) identifying those seeking recognition to speak, (c) showing or permitting the retrieval of the text of pending motions, and (d) showing the results of votes, if any. These electronic meetings of the Convention committees shall otherwise be subject to all rules adopted by the Convention to govern its annual meeting, which may include any reasonable limitations on and requirements for members' participation. Each delegate registered and attending the 2024 Annual Convention by the use of, or a means of, communications by which all delegates and/or members participating in the Convention may simultaneously hear each other shall be deemed to be present in person, and/or present and voting, as applicable, under these Rules of Order.

- Rule 2.05: Unless otherwise indicated, and with respect to balloting at Convention as described in Section 8.02, the following procedures shall apply only to the pre-Convention Committee meetings and proceedings:
  - A. Voting shall be conducted using anonymous voting software accessible over the Internet to all delegates unless a different method available through the Internet meeting service is ordered by the Bishop. An anonymous vote conducted through the designated voting software or through the Internet meeting service shall be deemed a ballot vote, fulfilling any requirement in the Constitution or Canons or rules of order that a vote be conducted by ballot. Votes shall be deemed anonymous so long as votes cast by an individual are available only to the administrator of the voting system.
  - B. Except when a vote via the voting platform is required, business may be conducted by unanimous consent, as expressed through the "raised hands" function of the Internet meeting platform.
  - C. Delegates shall identify themselves as required to sign in to the Internet meeting/voting service, and shall maintain at a minimum audio access throughout the meeting whenever present, though internet audio and video access is preferred.
  - D. If required for pre-Convention Committee business, the presence of a quorum shall be established by the online list of participating delegates.
  - E. Each delegate (or Convention Committee participant) is responsible for access and quality of their audio and internet connections necessary to participate; no pre-Convention Committee action shall be invalidated on the grounds that a delegate's or participant's individual connection prevented participation in the meeting.
  - F. In addition to display of pending business, motions or results of votes at Convention, or in connection with Convention Committees' pre-Convention business, if any, video of the Bishop and any officer or delegate currently recognized to speak or report shall be displayed throughout the meeting, as well as such other video displays as the Bishop designates in his discretion.
  - G. The procedure to be recognized for a motion, to seek the floor, to cast a vote, or for any other action by a delegate during the virtual meeting or at any pre-Convention meetings shall be governed by the provided instructions for using the features of the Internet meeting service to conduct business.
- Rule 2.06: Reports of all Committees shall be in writing. All reports recommending action by the Convention shall be accompanied by Resolutions for such action.

#### III. RESOLUTIONS

- Rule 3.01: Resolutions are submitted as the Canons may prescribe.
- Rule 3.02: All Resolutions and amendments proposed thereto shall be in writing and shall contain the name, parish, and city of the proponent and meet the deadline as set forth in Title I, Canon 3, Sec. 10.
- Rule 3.03: The Bishop shall refer all Resolutions to appropriate Convention Committees for consideration, recommendation, and report to the Convention; provided, however, upon a vote of two-thirds (2/3) of the delegates present, a Resolution may be considered immediately.

- Rule 3.04: Where two or more Resolutions deal basically with the same subject, they shall be referred to the same General Resolutions Committee. The Committee shall make every effort to consolidate them or otherwise assure their compatibility and should also make every effort to obtain the concurrence of the proponents concerned.
- Rule 3.05: Each Convention Committee to which a Resolution has been referred, after providing for an open hearing held remotely in the days leading up to the convention, shall consider the form and substance of the Resolution and in making its report shall recommend (a) for adoption, (b) for adoption with amendment, (c) for adoption of a substitute drafted by the Committee, (d) for rejection, or (e) for discharge from further consideration because the subject matter has been included in another Resolution. The Committee's recommendation to the Convention shall be in the form of a motion to adopt the Committee's recommendation. The Committee Chair or other representative shall state the reasons for the Committee's recommendation. Thereafter, the proponent of the original Resolution, which is the subject of the Committee's recommendation, shall be recognized first if the proponent so desires. Amendments may be offered, including an amendment to substitute the proponent's original Resolution for that recommended by the Committee.

#### IV. MOTIONS IN ORDER OF PRECEDENCE

• Rule 4.01: The following motions shall have priority in the order listed. The mover cannot interrupt a member who has the floor, must be recognized, and the motion must be seconded.

They are subject to the following further rules:

- (a) To Adjourn or to Recess
  - (1) Not debatable, if unqualified
  - (2) Not amendable
  - (3) Cannot be laid on Table
  - (4) Majority vote
  - (5) The motion to adjourn shall always be in order except that it shall not be offered when another member has the floor
- (b) To Adjourn to Time Certain
  - (1) Debatable, as to the time
  - (2) Amendable, as to the time
  - (3) Cannot be laid on Table
- (c) To Lay on Table or To Table
  - (1) Not debatable
  - (2) Not amendable
  - (3) Cannot be laid on Table
  - (4) Majority vote
- (d) To Vote Immediately or at Time Certain or to Extend Debate
  - (1) Not debatable
  - (2) Amendable, as to time, if a time specified
  - (3) Cannot be laid on Table
  - (4) Two-thirds majority vote
- (e) To Postpone to Time Certain
  - (1) Debatable
  - (2) Amendable as to time
  - (3) May be laid on Table
  - (4) Majority vote

- (f) To Commit or recommit to any Committee
  - (1) Debatable, except as to a Convention Committee
  - (2) Amendable as to the Committee to which to be sent
  - (3) May be laid on Table
  - (4) Majority vote
- (g) To Amend or To Substitute
  - (1) Amendments and Substitutes are debatable only when Main Question is debatable
  - (2) One Amendment may be made to each independent or separable portion of a Resolution; and the right to amend extends only to one Amendment of that Amendment and to a Substitute and one Amendment thereto
  - (3) A Substitute and its Amendment may be laid on Table, but cannot be otherwise voted on until original matter is perfected
  - (4) Majority vote
  - (5) Neither the Substitute nor its Amendment shall be voted on (except to lay on the Table) until the original matter is perfected.

#### V. MOTIONS WITHOUT ORDER OF PRECEDENCE

- Rule 5.01: The following motions have no order or priority but are subject to the following rules:
- (a) Appeal from Decision of Chair
  - (1) Debatable
  - (2) Not amendable
  - (3) May be laid on Table
  - (4) Majority vote; A tie vote sustains Chair
  - (5) Must be made immediately after decision
- (b) To Take from Table
  - (1) Not debatable
  - (2) Not amendable
  - (3) Cannot be laid on Table
  - (4) Majority vote
- (c) To Recall from Committee
  - (1) Debatable
  - (2) Amendable
  - (3) May be laid on Table
  - (4) Two-thirds majority vote
- (d) To Create Special Order of Day for a Particular Time
  - (1) Debatable
  - (2) Amendable as to time
  - (3) Cannot be laid on Table
  - (4) Two-thirds majority vote
- (e) Call for the order of the Day
  - (1) Mover may interrupt a member who has the floor and is not required to be recognized or to have a second
  - (2) Not debatable
  - (3) Not amendable
  - (4) Cannot be laid on Table
  - (5) No vote required, but two-thirds majority vote is necessary to suspend general or special order

- (f) To Suspend the Rules or Take Up Business Out of Order
  - (1) Debatable
  - (2) Not amendable
  - (3) Cannot be laid on the Table
  - (4) Two-thirds majority vote
- (g) To Divide the Question
  - (1) Not debatable
  - (2) Can be amended
  - (3) Cannot be laid on the Table
  - (4) Majority vote, if vote required
  - (5) May be made without being recognized and even though another member has the floor
  - (6) If the Question under debate contains several distinct propositions, which are independent of each other, at the request of any members the same shall be divided and a separate vote shall be taken but the motion to strike out and to insert shall be indivisible.
  - (7) The propositions relate to the same subject, and yet each part can stand alone, they may be divided into a regular motion and vote.

#### VI. RECONSIDERATION

- Rule 6.01: Neither a Question once determined, nor one of like import, shall again be brought before the Convention, except on motion to reconsider made by one who voted in the majority and seconded by another who voted in the majority.
- Rule 6.02: Motions to reconsider are subject to the following further rules:
  - (1) Debatable when motion to be reconsidered is debatable
  - (2) Not amendable
  - (3) May be laid on Table
  - (4) Two-thirds majority vote
  - (5) No question can be twice considered unless it was materially amended after its first reconsideration

#### VII. DECORUM AND DEBATE

- Rule 7.01: No member shall be absent from the Convention unless leave has been given by the Chair, or because of inability to attend.
- Rule 7.02: No member shall address the Convention or make any motion until after recognition by the Bishop except to make a parliamentary inquiry, a point of order, or a motion not requiring recognition.
- Rule 7.03: When any Delegate is about to speak, the Chair shall be addressed, and the name and parish of the Delegate stated; such address shall be confined strictly to the point of debate.
- Rule 7.04: Except by leave of the Convention, no Delegate shall speak more than twice in the same debate nor longer than five minutes at one time.

#### VIII. VOTING

- Rule 8.01: Nominations for Standing Committee, members of the Bishop and Council, Trustees of the University of the South, members of the Disciplinary Board and General Convention Deputies and Alternates, which are in writing and contain the nominee's name, parish, and city and not more than one hundred words of biographical information including past and present service of the nominee to the Church at all levels and received in the office of the Secretary thirty days prior to the opening of the Convention, shall be included in the pre-convention delegate preparation materials. All nominations from the floor of convention must be delivered to the Secretary of Convention no later than noon on the day before the first meeting of Convention commences to allow time for proper preparation for digital voting. In addition to the information required listed above, all such nominations shall contain the name, parish, and the city of the nominator who shall obtain the nominee's consent and willingness to serve prior to submitting nomination. Incomplete nominations will not be accepted. Any required information that cannot be verified prior to noon on February 9, 2023 will result in the nominations being disqualified. Verified, written nominations shall be posted at the Convention. Nominations may be made only by the Bishops of this Diocese, Clerical and Lay Delegates, Vestries, and any other person authorized by Canon.
- Rule 8.02: Balloting for the offices set forth in 8.01 may be conducted at the in-person business meeting of Convention by those delegates physically present using a virtual, electronic, internet or other online voting system or computer application approved by the Bishop with the approval of the Secretary and the Committee on Elections, or their designee. Within the Bishop's discretion, appropriate accommodation or provisions shall be made for assisting delegates without access to the balloting system, or that require technical assistance in voting. Votes/ballots cast using the virtual balloting system shall be deemed the equivalent of physical ballots or votes cast in person for all purposes hereunder. Votes shall be deemed anonymous so long as votes cast by an individual are only available to the administrator of the voting system. In the event of a technical failure of the digital voting system, the Bishop may direct the Secretary and the Committee on Elections to conduct a full ballot by paper in person, or by mail in the weeks immediately following convention.
- Rule 8.03: In elections of Deputies to the General Convention and of Members of the Bishop and Council, a majority of the votes cast shall be necessary to election. In all other elections, including that of Alternate Deputies to the General Convention, a plurality shall suffice. If the Convention shall take up other business while ballots are being counted such business may be interrupted for the report of the committee on Elections and additional ballots. If all the Deputies to the General Convention are not elected on the first ballot, the remainder are to be elected from the remaining nominees by majority on the second ballot, and if all are not elected on the second ballot, the remainder are to be elected from the remaining nominees by plurality on the third ballot. The sequence of alternates is determined on the final ballot taken.
- Rule 8.04: Unless otherwise expressly provided, any rules requiring a two-thirds majority shall be construed to mean the affirmative vote to two-thirds of the Delegates present and voting.
- Rule 8.05: Ballots with more or less votes than there are positions to be filled shall be declared invalid.

#### IX. COMMITTEE OF THE WHOLE

• Rule 9.01: Whenever so ordered by a vote of a majority of the members present, the Convention may go into Committee of the Whole for the consideration of any matter.

#### X. UNANIMOUS CONSENT

• Rule 10.01: By unanimous consent, any action may be taken that is not in contravention of any provision of the Constitution or the Canons.

#### XI. GENERAL REGULATIONS

• Rule 11.01: All materials distributed during the convention must have the express permission of the Bishop or otherwise be ordered by the majority vote of convention. No books, pamphlets or other printed matter may be distributed on the floor of Convention, or be placed on the seats or desks of the Delegates, likewise no digital materials may be shared via email or by the digital platform during the convention; but this prohibition shall not apply to Resolutions, reports, and other documents prepared or distributed by the Secretary or to ballots for elections.

#### XII. ROBERT'S RULES OF ORDER

• Rule 12.01: Except when in conflict with the Constitution or Canons, or any Rules herein contained, the latest edition of Robert's Rules of Order shall govern the interpretation of Rules and procedures to be followed.

#### XIII. AMENDMENTS

- Rule 13.01: These Rules may be amended at any time by a two-thirds majority vote of the members present.
- Rule 13.02: In accordance with Title 1 Canon 3 Sec. 6.(a), the Rules of Order from the previous convention are in force for the succeeding Convention unless, in order to adapt to changing circumstances that inform the Ecclesiastical Authority's decisions around convening digital or in person conventions, consistent with the said Canon, these Rules of Order may be modified and/or amended by action and authority of Bishop and Council in between conventions in anticipation of adoption with amendments at the start of the succeeding Convention.

## **Consent Agenda and Supporting Information**

A consent agenda is a meeting practice by which routine reports or non-controversial items not requiring discussion or independent action are presented as one agenda item. The clergy and delegates approve this "package" of items in one motion. This practice is used to save precious meeting time.

If any clergy or delegate wishes to remove any item from the Consent Agenda for discussion, he or she may do so with a motion during the discussion period after the Consent Agenda is moved and seconded. The motion to remove any item requires a second and a simple majority vote.

Consent agenda items can only be removed for discussion and not clarification. If any clergy or delegate member needs clarification of an item, this needs to be accomplished prior to the Business Meeting by contacting the Secretary of Convention.

Detailed information about each item on the Consent Agenda is provided below. By voting yes to the motion to approve the Consent Agenda, you are voting yes on the following:

## THE DIOCESE OF EAST TENNESSEE 2024 DIOCESAN CONVENTION Resolution # 2024-01

Courtesy invitations to provide seat and voice to ordained clergy, not canonically resident, but licensed to officiate, or to lead congregations; courtesy invitation to offer seat to ordained local leaders as well as to postulants and candidates for holy orders.

- **Sec. 1.** Lay Ministers requiring licensing in accordance with Title III, Canon 4 of the Canons of The Episcopal Church shall be encouraged in this Diocese and said Licensing shall be in compliance with the above Canon and in conformity with the training required by this Diocese.
- **Sec. 2.** Lay Ministers shall be trained as required by (a) the Canons of The Episcopal Church and (b) the written policy of the Bishop (as amended from time to time).
- **Sec 3.** No licensing shall be required of Lectors. A Lector shall be appointed by the Member of the Clergy in charge of the congregation in which the Lector is to serve to read lessons or to lead Prayers of the People.
- **Sec 4.** A Lector is a person trained in reading the Word and appointed without license by the Member of the Clergy in charge of the Congregation to read lessons or to lead the Prayers of the People.

#### **EXPLANATION OF RESOLUTION:**

The proposed revisions align this Canon with The Episcopal Church Canon. These revisions make space for an evolution of offerings by the Episcopal Church in East Tennessee as well as accommodation as the Canons of The Episcopal Church potentially change.

The Episcopal Church in East Tennessee currently offers discernment, formation, and licensing for Pastoral Leader, Worship Leader, Preacher, Eucharistic Minister, Eucharistic Visitor, and Catechist. Those are clearly listed in the Canons of The Episcopal Church (TEC). As well, The Episcopal Church in East Tennessee offers discernment, formation, and licensing for Evangelist Facilitator (a slight revision to TEC's list), and Pastoral Care Leader, a significantly different lay ministry than Pastoral Leader as listed. There are other Lay Ministries that The Episcopal Church in East Tennessee recognizes, celebrates, and supports but does not currently provide formation and licensing for.

The editorial changes remove the unnecessary listing of lay ministries, correct a typographical error in Sec. 3. and clarify the inconsistency in Sec. 3. and Sec 4.

**RESOLVED,** That Title IV Canon 1 Sec.2 be amended to include the following language:

**Sec. 2.** Each Parish shall be incorporated according to the laws of the state in which the Parish is located. A copy of the proposed corporate Charter and Bylaws shall be submitted to the Bishop, who will review, and may revise them, in consultation with the Chancellor. If after the Bishop grants his or her approval, the Parish shall proceed to become incorporated as a not-for-profit. Within thirty days of incorporation, a copy of the corporate Charter and Bylaws shall be filed in the Bishop's office. Any amendments to the Charter and Bylaws shall follow the same procedure. Each Parish shall comply with all state requirements to maintain its not-for-profit corporate status; and be it further

**RESOLVED,** That Title IV Canon 1 Sec 8. Be amended to include the following language:

**Sec. 8.** The Vestry shall administer the temporal affairs of the Parish; shall elect and call the Rector, unless otherwise set forth in these Canons, shall provide for the regular and well-ordered worship of Almighty God, and shall cooperate with the Rector in all efforts to develop the spiritual life of the Parish. Temporal affairs including merger falls withing the authority and approval of the Vestry. The Vestry shall, at all times, keep the church in proper condition for its uses, and likewise give proper care to all buildings and grounds belonging to the Parish. A quorum shall consist of not less than a majority of all the members of the Vestry in office immediately before a meeting begins and Vestry decisions shall be made by a majority vote unless otherwise provided by the By-laws of the Parish; and be it further

**RESOLVED,** That Title IV, Canon 3 be amended to include the following language:

#### **Canon 3: Merging Parishes**

In any area within the Diocese, if two or more existing parishes desire to merge into one existing or new Parish, then, the Vestry of each Parish must first submit to the Bishop a request to merge Parishes into one new or existing Parish.

Upon receipt of the request, the Bishop shall forward copies thereof for written comment to any existing Parish within a 10-mile radius of the proposed location of the new Parish. Such written comments shall be sent to the Bishop within sixty (60) days of receipt of the request. After the expiration of such sixty (60) day period, the Bishop shall send the request, together with the Bishop's comments and any written comments received from the existing Parishes to the Standing Committee for its consideration and consent. For good cause, so stated, the Bishop may shorten the sixty (60) day period to no less than twenty (20) days.

If the Standing Committee consents and the Bishop concurs, the parishes wishing to merge must follow the laws of the state in which they are located for merger of not-for-profit corporations and must comply with all Parish responsibilities under the Constitution and Canons; and be it further

**RESOLVED,** That Title IV Canon 3 be renumbered as well as the Canons numbered in the remaining Title IV.

#### **EXPLANATION OF THE RESOLUTION:**

The Proposed Revisions address the need for a process for parishes to merge. Specifically, the changes in Sec 2 address a typographical error and bring the section into compliance with The Episcopal Church (TEC). The changes in Sec 8. require a majority of the Vestry of each church to vote for a merger and clarifies the role of the Vestry. New Canon 3. Provides a process for churches to merge.

**RESOLVED:** That the Bishop and Council shall establish a task force of at least 3 members to provide coordination and communication for the pursuit of a goal of carbon net neutrality by 2030.

**RESOLVED:** That the task force is charged with developing information, resources and guidance regarding how each congregation and diocesan organization or ministry can develop a facility needs assessment to identify the actions necessary to enable its facilities and operations, with a goal of becoming carbon neutral by 2030.

**RESOLVED:** That the task force will report yearly to the Diocesan Convention on its progress towards developing information, resources and guidance on the steps to pursue carbon net neutrality, on the progress made by congregations and diocesan organizations and ministries to develop facility needs assessments, and on any further recommendations to the Diocese regarding reducing facility energy use and increasing facility energy efficiency.

#### **EXPLANATION OF THE RESOLUTION:**

At the General Convention in 2022, the Episcopal Church passed Resolution A087 which stated in part

Resolved, That the Episcopal Church commit to a goal of net carbon neutrality in its operations and the work of staff, standing commissions, interim bodies, and General Convention by 2030, through a combination of reducing emissions from travel, reducing energy use, increasing energy efficiency in buildings, and purchasing offsets from duly investigated, responsible, and ethical partners; ...


Resolved, That the General Convention encourage parishes, dioceses, schools, camps, and other Episcopal institutions to pursue their own goal of net carbon neutrality by 2030 through a combination of reducing emissions from travel, reducing energy use, increasing energy efficiency in buildings, and purchasing offsets from duly investigated, responsible, and ethical partners; and be it further

Climate neutrality refers to the idea of achieving net zero greenhouse gas emissions by balancing those emissions so they are equal (or less than) the emissions that get removed through the planet's natural absorption. Most discussions, including Resolution A087, include purchasing offsets as a part of a carbon neutrality strategy.

To carry out the intent of this resolution, one necessary set of actions will be for our parishes to first educate themselves regarding the carbon footprint of their facilities using standard tools and data to estimate parish facility greenhouse gas emissions, and to next develop a facility needs assessment to identify the actions necessary to enable its facilities and operations to become carbon neutral by 2030.

We recognize that there are no one size fits all solutions to achieving the Church's goal of net carbon neutrality. Our churches have facilities which differ greatly in age, use, size and other factors. Churches which have begun this process have encountered difficulties in obtaining reliable facility information such as energy audits, and financial barriers. However, there are increasing numbers of resources and there are many lower cost steps which can be implemented without undue financial investments.

The Diocese recognizes that our congregations and other diocesan organizations will need assistance with information and resources as they develop their needs assessments, and further recognizes that within our congregations, there may be untapped expertise and resources that could assist the achievement of energy efficiency goals. The Dioceses further recognizes that other institutions, including government agencies, non-profits such as Interfaith Power and Light, and business entities are supporting and pursuing goals of carbon net neutrality. A task force of dedicated individuals could assist our parishes by sharing stories of progress in achieving goals, compiling reliable resources, coordinating communications and highlighting barriers to progress towards a goal of carbon neutrality.



## Report from the Standing Committee

There are six members of the Standing Committee of the Diocese of East Tennessee: three clergy and three lay, elected by the Diocesan Convention to serve three-year terms. This year, the Standing Committee met monthly and alternated meetings in person and on Zoom.

The primary function of the Standing Committee is to serve as a council of advice to the Bishop, to consent for persons seeking Ordination, to approve the purchase, sale, or encumbrance of any real property held by the Diocese (including any parish, community, school, or other organization that may hold property in trust for the Diocese), and consent to the election of bishops throughout the Episcopal Church. In the absence of the Bishop, the Standing Committee acts as the ecclesiastical authority for the Diocese.

## **Report from the Commission on Ministry**

The Commission on Ministry (COM) consists of ten members—lay ministers, priests, and deacons—who assist the bishop with "the determination of present and future opportunities and needs for the ministry of all baptized persons" in the Diocese of East Tennessee. A primary function of the COM is to facilitate the discernment process for East Tennessee Episcopalians who are exploring a call to ordained ministry.

Over the course of 2023, the COM met six times in person and three times via teleconference. Our meetings typically consist of time for prayer and reflection, planning for retreats and other events, updates on people in our diocesan discernment process, and canonically required actions.

We held an in-person discernment retreat at Grace Point Camp and Retreat Center in Kingston November 16 and 17, 2023. We are grateful to the staff at Grace Point for providing such generous hospitality and a wonderful space to gather. The retreat went very well, and we enjoyed getting to know and discern with the three seekers in attendance.

We hosted the *Here I Am* Retreat Day at the Episcopal School of Knoxville on May 13, 2023. More than 30 people attended the retreat. We hope to hold another retreat on April 27, 2024, at the Episcopal School of Knoxville. We will publicize details and begin registration shortly. The retreat day is designed for anyone discerning a call to licensed lay ministry, the vocational diaconate, or the priesthood, it will include worship, presentations by ministry leaders, and time for reflection and discussion.

We were thrilled to celebrate three ordinations this year. On June 3, Bishop Cole ordained Zachary Settle a deacon and on December 16 a priest. Bishop Cole also ordained Kat Chappell a priest on July 15. The Rev. Zac Settle, PhD is serving as a curate at Grace Episcopal Church in Chattanooga. The Rev. Kat Chappell is serving as a Curate at St. Timothy's Episcopal Church in Signal Mountain.

Currently, we have twelve postulants and four candidates in formation for ordained ministry. Some are enrolled in seminary and working on a Master of Divinity, others are engaged in alternative formation programs, and others will begin their studies in the coming months. Meanwhile, we have five seekers working with Companions in Discernment in their local congregations.

It is an honor to serve on this commission. We invite your prayers for the work that we do and for all who are in discernment.

## Report from the Small Church Equity Task Force

On February 4, 2023 at Diocesan Convention for the Episcopal Diocese of East Tennessee, Resolution 2023-07, also known as the The Small Church Equity Task Force Resolution, passed after an energetic discussion and some amending motions from the floor of Convention. In the months following its passing, representatives for Bishop and Council have been conducting research and exploratory conversations to help provide resources and some guiding questions for the Task Force that will be charged with the "study of how clergy leadership is valued across the diocese specifically in relation to clergy serving large parishes versus those serving small parishes."

Given the parameters of the resolution of an equal number clergy and laity and an equal number of members of small (ASA 75 or less) and large (ASA 76 or more) parishes, it became clear that the Task Force would need to be made up of a total number of members that is divisible by the number four. After consulting with a Family Systems Therapist, it seemed that a viable committee could consist of eight members: two clergy from small parishes and two clergy from large parishes as well as two laity from small parishes and two laity from large parishes. With hopes of representing a variety of people and parish situations in a relatively small number for Task Force members various interests and settings were discussed as guidelines for choosing the Task Force. Factors considered are:

- 1. Representation that recognizes the variety of congregations within the designation large such as setting, various clergy roles such as rector, associate/ assistant rector, and clergy with additional responsibilities in that setting such as a school or other institution.
- 2. Representation that recognizes the variety of congregations within the designation of small such as setting and various clergy roles such as rector, priest in charge, vicar, deacon in charge, extended supply clergy, or clergy shared with another ministry.
- 3. Representation from both small and large congregations that includes a variety of service within the congregation and in the world such as warden, licensed lay minister, finance, human resources, health, education, creation care, not for profit, etc.
- 4. Representation that includes consideration of age, gender, race, and time in the parish.
- 5. At the suggestion of the Family Systems specialist, representation that considers birth order in one's family of origin.

In reflecting on the Resolution, the question of "What does 'Valued' mean" in the context of a congregation, of the Diocese, and of the wider community is an important discussion for the Task Force to consider. It may be important for the Task Force to set up listening sessions in various areas of the Diocese to explore this question with others. There are several factors mentioned in the Resolution, but also the invitation for other "information and additional data" to enter the conversation. We anticipate that conversation around this question will yield other factors, some of which might not be as readily measured as the five factors identified in the Resolution.

Given the variety of titles for clergy in service to a congregation, the Task Force is invited to consider the various designations for clergy serving a particular parish:

Rector
Priest in Charge
Deacon in Charge
Vicar
Interim Rector
Supply Clergy
Chaplain
Assistant Rector
Associate Rector
Assisting Clergy
Priest non-stipendiary
Deacon non-stipendiary

In this consideration of clergy and congregation, how does the designation relate to the five factors given by the Resolution should be explored.

The Task Force will also need to discuss what year and/or years they want to consider in assessing the average Sunday attendance and annual operating income of each congregation. While these numbers are accessible from the annual Parochial Report of each congregation, Bishop and Council is aware that 2022's Parochial Report in our diocese saw an increase in the number of churches that fell into the small church category outlined in the Resolution. A given year's Parochial Report can be accessed with help from Diocesan Staff such as a print out of all the congregational reports. Still, the Task Force will need to decide which year or years to use given that 2020, 2021, and 2022 have had numbers significantly impacted by the pandemic from inability to attend in person, how Sunday attendance is counted in a given setting, and changes in budgets including some that had added income from the government Paycheck Protection Program.

In looking at clergy compensation including salary, total pension accessibility, and medical benefits, some numbers will be available through the Church Pension Fund. Because there are other elements included in some congregational clergy compensation line items such as phone, travel, etc., the Task Force may want to reach out to individual congregations for that information in addition to what Church Pension Fund may provide.

The above is based on initial conversations by Bishop and Council and others. We anticipate that more considerations and exploration by the Task Force will further the Diocesan wide conversation that the Resolution seeks to facilitate.

## Justice in Banking Resolution Report from Bishop and Council

At the beginning of the 2023 Diocesan Convention Business Meeting, the Rt. Rev. Brian Cole referred Resolution 2023-08 ("Justice in Banking") to Bishop and Council (B&C) for further exploration. At their first meeting with the new class in 2023, B&C then referred it to the Becoming Beloved Community, who affirmed the impetus behind the resolution. However, they saw it as beyond the scope of their particular expertise, so they referred it back to B&C for further exploration.

B&C collected information from other dioceses as it was available, specifically policies addressing ethical investing, but in this process we have found that our diocese may be the first to explore this topic through the lens of demographics and equality in lending practice.

Fortunately, Ms. Jeanne Hogarth, a member of B&C from the South East area (Thankful Memorial, Chattanooga), has extensive professional experience with banking regulations. Her knowledge was indispensable in collecting further information and metrics; so when the resolution was referred to the Finance Committee for further exploration, she acted as liaison, shepherding the resulting draft policy through its construction.

The Finance Committee's draft is now set to be taken up by Bishop and Council for implementation. Rather than a directive resolution, this has now taken the form of a comprehensive set of guidelines and points of education for parishes to implement and research. This policy has also been presented to other interested community partners who regularly engage in this work- including the original proposer, Mr. Rick Roach (St. Luke's, Knoxville)- for any comments they may have.

Because there is no one metric or listing of financial institutions with good practices in these complicated areas, this policy will always be a work in progress; but we hope it can be a starting point for important conversations in your communities and with your financial institutions as the Church continues to pursue our Baptismal call to "respect the dignity of every human being."

## Mission & Lay Ministry Report to Diocesan Annual Convention #40

All baptized Christians are called to ministry, and some are called to be more deeply formed for specific ministries. The Episcopal Church in East Tennessee provides discernment and formation for lay ministers as Preachers, Pastoral Care Leaders, Worship Leaders, Evangelist Facilitators, Pastoral Leaders, and Catechists at sponsoring parishes.

Here We Are, all of us

Living our baptismal covenant as a community through discernment, formation, and practice of ministry And as individuals, proclaiming, Here I Am

We continued to partner with **Bexley-Seabury**, an Episcopal seminary in Chicago. This relationship provides online formation for most of the licensed lay ministries we support, leveraging gifts of some of the best instructors from across the country through a robust infrastructure. As members of their Wisdom Circle, we meet with Bexley leadership as well as diocesan leaders from all over The Episcopal Church (TEC) to discuss how their formation is impacting our local ministry as well as ways to evolve it. This membership also provides for scholarships where tuition assistance is needed. Popular courses in 2023 included Worship Leader Training and Preaching: Claiming Your Voice. In 2024 we commend to you Evangelist Leadership, Pastoral Leader, Faith Formation Leaders, Discernment & Personal Enrichment, and courses that make up Fundamentals of Faith - Foundations of Baptismal Living, Theology & Ethics, and Engaging God's Story.

We continued to recognize The University of the South, Sewanee's **Education for Ministry** (EfM) as the ideal foundational formation for all lay ministers, especially years 1 & 2 of the 4-year program to meet the prerequisite for courses in specific licensed lay ministries. Contact our EfM Diocesan Coordinator, Mr. Adam Wilson for details about an EfM class near you.

The diocese renewed their membership in **Forma**, a ministry of Lifelong Learning at Virginial Theological Seminary (VTS), and a Network for Christian Formation for the Episcopal Church and beyond. Forma hosts an annual conference, which most recently (will have) occurred in January 2024 as A Way in the Wilderness in a "radically hybrid" format. Our membership provides access to a private online platform with a searchable resource library and discussion thread, opportunities to connect leaders working in similar roles, and regular programming. Through a scholarship award, we attended Forma's Returning & Becoming, featuring Pádraig Ó Tuama, at Kanuga in June. Through LPTI grant funds, we spoke at and participated in Forma sponsored It's All About Love: A Festival for the Jesus Movement in Baltimore in July.

Last year we told you the national Episcopal Preaching Foundation (EPF) had invited our diocese and five others (from 30+ applicants) to participate in a pilot offering, **Lay Preacher Training Initiative** (LPTI), supported by a grant from Trinity, Wallstreet. We began the two-year curriculum in January 2022, allowing us to join others in leveraging talented preaching instructors from all over the world, including materials from The Iona Collective, in EPF's first focus on forming lay preachers. In November 2023, we commissioned Courtney Shea (Good Shepherd, Knoxville), Ed Hochnedel (Good Samaritan, Knoxville), Kimberly Kilgore (St Peter's, Chattanooga), and Freida Heron (St Andrew's, Maryville) along with 26 others at The National Cathedral in D.C. EPF has learned from this pilot and are currently revising the curriculum for a 12-month format. We plan to make the new curriculum available to a cohort of participants in the Fall of 2024.

We were invited into another pilot with the EPF, supported by a Lilly grant. **The Preaching Congregation** (**TPC**) is a collaborative engagement of the laity in exegesis and preaching feedback. TPC serves as rich engagement in study of scripture, a deeper connection to the congregation, discernment for preaching the Good News by the laity, and support for preachers in the evolution of their craft for the context. Early participants include Christ Church, South Pittsburgh, St Francis, Norris, and St Francis, Ooltewah.

We promised to return to offering regional, in-person formation, like had been available before the pandemic and for the preceding 15+ years. Unfortunately, there wasn't enough interest in **Foundations in Holy Scriptures**, and three classes were cancelled.

We had just enough interest in in-person instruction by The Rev. Amy Morehous and have four students of **Preaching** that currently meet in Knoxville. We hope to commission them all as preachers this Summer.

The diocese purchased a subscription to a large library of video courses through **ChurchNext**. Check out all they have to offer at https://www.churchnext.tv/library/ and let us know if there is a course you, your small group, or your parish would be interested in adding to our own custom library for East Tennessee. In August, September, and October of 2023, we offered facilitated online courses for Eucharistic Ministers, Eucharistic Visitors, and Worship Leaders with great success. This was especially helpful for some of our smaller parishes.

At the invitation of The Episcopal Church (TEC), we co-hosted with The University of the South, Sewanee's Center for Religion and Environment (CRE) **Learning to Lead from the Land**. This environmental workshop was offered to educators and community gardeners as well as other environmentalists from TN and AL in September at St Mary's, Sewanee. Bishop Cole, Andy Thompson (CRE), and Jerusalem Greer (TEC) provided participants with an expanded agrarian community and ways to take their learning back to their own context.

In August 2023, the diocese held its first **Leadership Summit** at Grace Point Retreat Center. The Bishop, Council, Standing Committee, and chairs of the Commission on Ministry (CoM) and Disciplinary Board gathered as 21 decision makers for the diocese to increase understanding, trust, and engagement. All enjoyed Grace Point's new retreat facilities and took something of value back to their roles in diocesan leadership. Plans for more leadership development are in the works. Bishop Cole and Jon Humber were hosts. Archdeacon Askew, Emily Kirk, plus Canons Bolt and Hurley Hill were facilitators.

This year, we will, with God's help:

- continue to support the **CoM** in discerning with individuals and contributing to the Here I Am discernment retreat, assuring pathways for all ministers, lay and ordained
- reconvene a **Christian Formation Working Group** to respond to parish needs by leveraging resources, gifts, and talents throughout the diocese
- continue to foster a culture of learning through feedback, reflection, discernment, experimentation, and formation
- listen to all who desire **formation for ministry of the laity**, and identify then procure the best possible resources available

The Evangelism Working Group used the 2023 program year for reflection, discernment, and searching for our stories as East Tennessee Episcopalians. We also dedicated our 2023 budget to Invite, Welcome, Connect coaching stipends for small parishes that participated in the 2022 Invite, Welcome, Connect workshop. While the working group decided that diocesan-wide evangelism workshops should be offered only periodically, citing the year 2025 as a potential year for another diocesan-wide workshop, the group discerned that we should foster local evangelism efforts and help collect local stories.

While our year did not have any diocesan-hosted formation for evangelism, one of our working group members provided an excellent follow-up to the Evangelism for a Whole New World workshop held in 2022. In a gracious act, Mr. Drew Jeske-Polyak offered to facilitate a six-session offering of the Episcopal Church's Embracing Evangelism series to any parish in the diocese in either in-person or online format free of charge or cost. One parish, St. Francis, Norris, took the leap and signed on for the series. Mr. Jeske-Polyak has agreed to continue offering this opportunity for all our parishes. He will be hosting a workshop on Embracing Evangelism at the 40th annual convention. Please stop by to hear about this continued offering and how you can bring the work of evangelism to your parish.

We are all called to evangelism as Christians. Whether you're a lay member of the congregation, a vowed religious, or ordained clergy, you and your journey are part of the broader mission of evangelism in The Episcopal Church.

## **Grace Point Report to the 40th Annual Convention**



Greetings from the shore of Watts Bar Lake and the grounds of Grace Point Camp! We are overjoyed to inform you about all the growth and improvements that have occurred in 2023.

This year we completed the new Retreat Village. Everyone who has had the opportunity to use the new facilities have been impressed and most groups have already rescheduled for the upcoming year. We have been blessed by the enthusiasm of all our guests and because of this we have doubled our bookings from the year before.

This summer we hosted over 500 people during our summer camp season. Our camper participation increased again this year by over 10%. Additionally, we were able to offer over \$18,000 in scholarships, which was 35% of our campers.

Opportunities for Grace Point campers extended beyond traditional scholarships. We hosted a record high 38 campers in our outreach camp, Jim Muir Kamp 4 Kids. This outreach camp is designed for children with an incarcerated family member so that they might spend time in an intentional community and experience the love of Christ. Each camper received a full scholarship to attend Grace Point, which was an additional \$13,300 in scholarships. This would not be possible without the love and support of the parishes and individuals within the Diocese of East Tennessee.

We also hosted Sunshine Camp. This camp is for individuals of all ages with physical or intellectual disabilities. We were all blessed to spend a day with these wonderful people, kayaking, swimming, dancing, and experiencing the love of one another.

As you can see, growth at Grace Point extends beyond building new facilities and making physical improvements. Our numbers alone are proof that our campers and our retreat guests are experiencing the love of Christ here on the banks of Watts Bar lake in this thin place we all can call home away from home, Grace Point!

### **Tyson House Student Foundation**

Life on a university campus is one of constant beginnings and endings in the regular procession of academic careers. This year on the campus of UT Knoxville, we met many new faces and learned new stories of folks who have come to call Tyson House their own community, including one who

The weekly rhythm at Tyson House consists of daily fellowship and prayer at the House, weekly Bible Study, Catechism classes, regular service and social events, and Dinner and Worship (Eucharist) on Sunday evenings at 6:04. Smokey's Pantry – a FISH Hospitality food pantry (smokeyspantry.wordpress.com) and an Alcoholics Anonymous group are regular ministries that connect us to the needs of our community. In November, we gathered with campus ministries from ETSU, Tusculum, Lee, and Georgia Tech for a retreat at Grace Point, with Br. David Butzu, OSB leading our worship. Tyson House has benefitted from the work and ministry of Br. David for many years, especially stemming from his work with the Adoration community (adorationonline.wordpress.com) in Johnson City, TN.



As many of you know, the Tyson House building is being put on the market with the proceeds of a sale ear-marked for continued campus ministry at UTK. Though we do not yet have a timeline, we do have a contingency plan in the works for office and worship space on campus. Part of this plan involves deepening our relationship with the Wesley Foundation, the United Methodist campus ministry at UT, with whom we have co-labored for many, many years. We do expect to be in our current building through the Spring semester. This change will certainly reshape how we approach ministry on the UT campus, giving us an opportunity for self assessment and repositioning for a vibrant future in ministry. We are especially encouraged by the continued and increased commitment and funding for campus ministry by the Southeastern Synod of the ELCA and the Episcopal Diocese of East Tennessee for the crucial work of



outreach to and discipleship of college students at UTK and young adults throughout our region.

But at the end of the day, Tyson House is really your ministry because so many of you keep showing up over and over again: Parish ministries bring meals on Sunday evenings. Youth groups collect food for the Pantry. Representatives from our parishes serve on our Council. Br. Andrew Morehead, OC generously gives his gifts of music every Sunday night. The Sweany's cut the grass. Bishops Cole and Strickland generously find funding. And especially each of our students who embody Christ to each other and this campus. Christ is truly in our midst!

# Report on Companion Diocese Relationship with Kondoa

Our companion diocese of Kondoa, Tanzania, continues to grow despite the issues of poverty and the ongoing severe drought. East Tennessee's relationship with Kondoa continues via emails, What's App calls, and a pilgrimage in June 2023.

The Diocese of Kondoa, under the leadership of Bishop Given Gaula continues to grow through evangelism and sharing the love of our Lord, Jesus Christ. The bishop's wife, the Rev. Lilian Gaula is also instrumental in this work. This area is predominantly Muslim, but by living examples of Christ's love, many people are being baptized and confirmed into the Anglican Church.

Last year's pilgrims, led by Rev. Dorrie Pratt, included two parishioners from Good Shepherd, Heidi Timmerman and her daughter, Sophia Timmerman-Pelensky, Elizabeth Colonna, the Kondoa communication coordinator for our diocese, Drew Jeffrey (Good Samaritan) and 2 granddaughters from New Hampshire. This was the first time that teenagers were among the pilgrims! Soccer balls were taken the villages, which initiated an impromptu game. The game of Pick-Up Sticks was introduced and shared in each village. In these villages, children do not have toys, so the game was enjoyed by all. The three girls also attended choir practice throughout the week, then sang with one of the choirs at the cathedral the final Sunday.

Sophia chose as her Girl Scout Gold award to raise funds for books for St Peter - St Paul primary school. The pilgrims saw the "library" at the school, which had about 5 books on the shelf and the school has had one book per classroom from which the children are taught. Sophia has raised \$7,785.21 toward her goal to provide a book for each child in each subject. A book costs \$5; the hope is to have an ongoing fund to supply books for St Peter - St Paul primary school and for Chemba. Photos have been shared of smiling children each holding a book!

The school in Chemba is still under construction. This will be a secondary level school, both a day school as well as a residential school once the government of Tanzania allows it to open. The hope is that St Peter-St Paul students will feed into Chemba. They would also like to build a conference gathering space and a medical clinic for the diocese at the site in Chemba. Bishop Gaula sees education as an important part of his ministry with his people.

The new cathedral continues to be a proud accomplishment. It has a predominant spire visible as you enter Kondoa. The old, much smaller cathedral space continues to be used as a holy space.

Our diocese has generously sent funding throughout this year in the amount of \$41,400.00. Bishop Given and his people are grateful for the support received. East Tennessee continues to work with the diocese of Rochester, England as well as a missionary group in New Zealand to help Kondoa grow as a missionary diocese into hopefully sustaining itself in the future.

Plans are underway for Bishop Given and Lilian to come to East Tennessee in spring 2024. They will visit several parishes in East Tennessee. Stay tuned! Additionally, plans for a pilgrimage in 2025 are being discussed. Please prayerfully consider coming along for a life changing experience.

# Metropolitan Ministries (MetMin) 2023: A Brief Review

Metropolitan Ministries (MetMin) is a community hub where people in crisis find help for today and stability for tomorrow. Now entering its 44th year. In 2023, Metropolitan Ministries was named United Ways Non-profit of the year, welcomed the Cempa Community Care Clinic, launched its rapid rehousing and diversion from homelessness initiatives, expanded our services for those experiencing homelessness, and navigating pathways for recovery for those experiencing addiction.

MetMin has secured funding for our new jobs and education director for 2024-26. The director will be providing opportunities for job opportunities, collaborating with companies and agencies for employment, providing training and certification courses, and education programs like GED or Google certificates. We have secured partnerships with the Tennessee American Jobs Center and Chattanooga State Community College. MetMin is excited to welcome McKamey Animal Center as our new on-site partner to provide pet services for those in our community.

MetMin's response to these challenges in 2022 saw significant impact of support for 8,832 households throughout the Southeast Tennessee and North Georgia region. Of those households, 13,276 adults and 6,467 children were supported through our home eviction prevention, utility disruption, emergency shelter and our supplemental nutrition grocery store. MetMin help to secure housing for 34 households through our rapid rehousing and our diversion from homelessness initiatives. MetMin provide supportive services for transportation, bikes, gear, medical services, daily nutrition, and showers. The Impact Hub shower program is providing a basic human need for those experiencing homelessness and our guests report this is very therapeutic experience for them each week.

MetMin's strategic plan has identified 5 areas of focus as we continue to grow and expand our services. Currently we are in year 2 of our strategic plan and we have accomplished 50% of our identified tasks towards accomplishing these goals. The 5 goals are: People – to create a robust and diversified board, staff and volunteers, Service – to develop and enhance the guest service experience, Partnerships – to identify, recruit, and formalize intentional collaborations and partnerships to advance the services of the Impact Hub, Mission Impact – to develop an annual communications and marketing strategy to advance the mission of Metropolitan Ministries Impact Hub, and Fiscal development – to create fiscally sound financial practices for long-term stability and advancement.

MetMin is continuing to expand our services at the Impact Hub by recruiting a new partner for behavioral health and a chaplain program. One of our most sought after requests is for prayer. In 2024, the chaplain and prayer programs are a way to increase volunteers and serve our guests with the humble spirit of Christ. From all of us here at MetMin we want to thank you for your support and prayers. Each day brings new challenges and opportunities. We ask for your continued prayers for our guests, our staff, and our volunteers. You matter.<sup>TM</sup>

# Report of Sewanee Trustees to the 2024 Diocesan Convention

The University of the South is the only institution of higher education founded and governed by the dioceses of the Episcopal Church. The bishops, clergy, and laity of more than two-dozen dioceses form the core of the University's Board of Trustees. The annual meeting of the Board of Trustees was held October 18-19, 2023. On October 19, Robert Pearigen was installed as the 18th Vice Chancellor and President of the University. Vice Chancellor Pearigen's remarks to the more than 150 Trustees gathered reminded us that we are among the University's most important recruiters to both the College and the Seminary.

# How does the Diocese of East Tennessee engage with the University?

One hundred and one students from the Diocese of East Tennessee are enrolled in the College, with an additional 7 Seminarians from the Diocese. Currently, 24 School of Theology alumni serve in the diocese, and there are 12 EFM groups. Diocesan and parish support for FY 23 totaled \$21,223, with 12% of parishes making a gift to Sewanee. Support from our Diocese helps Sewanee meet the financial need of its students.

### How do your Trustees serve the Board and the University?

Your Trustees are active, serving on the following committees: Agenda Committee (Anna Graham) Church Support & Relations (The Rev. Matthew Farr), Constitution & Ordinances (David Sanders), Enrollment & Student Success (Anna Graham), Orientation & Trustee Development (Anna Graham). Our very own Bishop Brian Cole, who in January 2023 was elected to fill an unexpired clergy term on the Board of Regents, was elected in October as a Bishop Trustee Regent. Regents of the University establish, maintain, and govern the University in all ways other than those powers that are expressly reserved for the Board of Trustees.

#### An update of the School of Theology:


Renovation of Hamilton Hall for the School of Theology is expected to be completed in time for the opening of semester in August 2024. The Rev. Kevin Goodman has been hired as the new Executive Director of Education for Ministry (EfM) and is working to update EfM's delivery mode to expand its audiences. The Rev. Matt Farr, Chair of the Church Support & Relations Committee, encourages all parishes to serve as ambassadors to the University, encouraging their youth to consider Sewanee and to "wave the Sewanee banner" at diocesan conventions.

#### An update on the College of Arts & Sciences:

The University received the largest applicant pool in its history, with the University enrolling 452 first year students and 24 transfer students, hailing from 31 states and 14 foreign countries.

# **Opportunity Fund**

The yearly income from the fund is divided and made available to the Bishop and Council for grants: one-half to church expansion and one-half to social ministries. Throughout its history, the Opportunity Fund has awarded grants for **Church Expansion** in the amount of \$1,885,595 and for **Social Ministry** in the amount of \$1,660,264.

- a. Church expansion grants include money for land purchases for future sites; land, buildings, and equipment for existing worshiping communities; and building and equipment needs of parishes beyond the means of the congregation.
- b. Social ministry grants include assistance to parishes and worshiping communities within the Diocese that seek support for ministries that meet basic human needs (food, shelter, and energy, as well as emotional, educational and spiritual) and those ministries that seek to affect personal and/or societal transformation through education, rehabilitation and allocation of resources according to the mission and ministry of the Church. Ministries may be separate entities but must have significant Episcopal Church involvement and their grant applications must be approved by Vestry/Council/Board of Directors of their sponsoring Diocesan organization.




# **Episcopal School of Knoxville Parking Map**





Our population is aging, the average Episcopalian is 56 and yet we Americans are a particularly a 'death denying' culture.
